Understanding the Results



### **TYPE**

Annexation - an existing municipality seeks to expand their political boundaries by adding unincorporated territory to it.

Simplified Boundary Change

- 1. Annexation where a petition signed by 75% of the property owners in the area seek annexation to a particular municipality. The municipality is the proposing agent for such a proposal.
- 2. Transfer of Jurisdiction between municipalities this is a situation where jurisdiction is transferred between municipalities, leaving each municipality a separate legal entity.
- 3. Transfer of Jurisdiction between municipality and the county.

<u>Consolidation</u> - two or more municipalities merge to become one.

<u>Incorporation</u> - when an unincorporated area seeks to incorporate.

### **STATUS**

Active - the proposal is currently under consideration or has been submitted during the current proposal cycle.

<u>Archived</u> - a proposal submitted during an earlier proposal cycle.

<u>Historical</u> - a proposal submitted before 1999 under previous iterations of the Boundary Commission statute.

<u>Withdrawn</u>- a proposal withdrawn by the proposing agent before any decision was reached.

<u>Withdrawn - Historical</u> - a proposal submitted prior to 1999 & withdrawn by the proposing agent before any decision was reached.

#### **OUTCOME**

<u>Approved by Commission</u> - 1) a Proposal approved by the Commission and requiring no vote or 2) approved by the commission and waiting for the election to take place.

<u>Rejected by Commission</u> - proposal rejected and no vote will be taken.

<u>Approved by Voters</u> - After approval from the commission, the voters decided in an election to be annexed, consolidated, or incorporated.

Rejected by Voters - the proposal is rejected by voters at the ballot box.
